Aurora Pulls The Plug on BPL

ABC news reported today that Tasmanian electricity retailer, Aurora Energy, is planning to end its Tasmanian BPL trial.

The Aurora Chief Executive, Peter Davis, is reported to have said that Aurora's BPL trial "does not have the resources to maintain its viability", and "certainly it hasn't been a good money-making exercise for Aurora".



Aurora spent about \$2 million since the inception of the trial in 2004, and during that time has seriously addressed the interference aspects of BPL with some success. However at the end of the day it appears that the economics in an increasingly competitive environment just didn't stack up for BPL in Tasmania.

Naturally that won't be the end of BPL in Australia with several mainland trials continuing and possibly more planned, and it is not certain at this stage what will happen to the existing installed BPL infrastructure.

125 YEARS LATER, TESLA'S VICTORY IS COMPLETE

New York, the city that Thomas Edison electrified 125 years ago, has completed the transition from direct to alternating current, helping to erase the vestiges of a feud between giants of invention.

Last week, the Consolidated Edison utility pulled the plug on direct-current service. Electric operations manager Fred Simms, a Con Ed employee for 52 years, cut a ceremonial cable on a Manhattan street.

The change means that Con Ed now exclusively uses the alternating-current system invented by Nikola Tesla. The utility is named for Edison, whose Pearl Street Station in Manhattan was the nation's first central electrical power plant, serving 59 customers with direct current starting in 1882.



In the so-called "war of currents," Edison feuded with Tesla and George Westinghouse over which transmission method to adopt -- even publicly electrocuting animals in an attempt to show that AC was too dangerous.

AC, however, proved superior, as transformers allowed electricity to travel over long-distance wires. Con Ed froze the development of the DC system in 1928 but continued to supply New York's major DC customers with the existing system.

In January 1998, Con Ed began to eliminate DC service. At that time, there were more than 4,600 DC customers. By last year, there were 60.

Con Ed spokesman Robert McGee said some of the city's elevators still operate with DC using rectifiers that convert the utility's AC service.

Blackpool man sets new world record

A South Shore man is making waves on the radio scene – using home-made kit to pull off an international first.

Amateur radio enthusiast Dave Starkie, 53, of Kidbrooke Avenue, South Shore, has set a new world record for the longest radio transmission – from Blackpool to New Zealand. Mr Starkie and friend Keith Sharples, 44, were able to speak to each other from the opposite ends of the world using a mobile bike radio and backpack they had designed and built themselves.

The radio wave, transmitted on a 20 metre short wave band, travelled from South Shore promenade to New Brighton Pier, Christchurch, New Zealand – a total distance of 21,000km (13,000 miles).

Greetings Everyone

Welcome to this Special Issue of Headquarters-Info-Line. In This Special Issue:

- Radio Fee's Review for 2007

It was announced yesterday, via the MED Radio Spectrum Management web site that as a result of the Radio Fee's Review for 2007 - that the fee currently charged by the MED for repeaters, beacons and fixed links for the Amateur Service are not increasing, but remaining at the same level, (\$50.00 per annum, reduced by 10% to \$45.00 per annum if paid on-line). Additionally it is noted first that the regulations include a ten percent reduction in licence fees for licence holders who undertake their own interference investigations and secondly that the cost for engineering the same licenses has increased from \$300.00 to \$400.00.

NZART extends it's thanks to the submission submitted by the two previous ALO's, namely Bruce Douglas ZL2WP and Mark Gooding ZL2UFI; as this no doubt lead to the successful case of at least keeping the fee's at their current level. Members will recall that a figure of \$250 p.a. was a possibility. This shows the value of the submission process and is good example of what NZART is doing for its members, and for amateurs as a whole.

As part of the press statement from the minister responsible for this fee's increase, David Cunliffe stated in part the following:

"Mr Cunliffe said there will be no changes to the amateur licence fees for repeaters, beacons and fixed links - but these will be included in a review of the amateur fees to be commenced in the New Year."

The new ALO Don Wallace ZL2TLL will be taking up this "new" review referred to by the minister when next meeting with the MED.

The new fee structure takes effect on 1 February 2008.
