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U.K. National Hamfest

So, here I am, sitting in a rather palatial hotel suite at Hong Kong airport with 12 hours to kill before my next flight to Sydney is due to leave. (I only asked for a day room!). A good time to put the newsletter together, and to say a little about the U.K. National Hamfest, which I was able to attend.

It took place on Friday/Saturday 29/30 September at Newark Showground (Lincolnshire). The weather was the usual British rubbish, grey and overcast with frequent heavy showers. This gave a few problems to the exhibitors outside, who had to constantly cover and uncover their goods.

On arrival, the first impression was “where did all these cars come from?”. I arrived early to avoid the crowds but, as can be seen, there were already zillions of cars bristling with antennas. It only got worse later on. I, for one, am not used to that scale of event in N.Z.



The main event was held in a large hall. This also rapidly filled with folks keen to get their hands on something of interest. The first signs that some had been successful were the apparitions of middle-aged men (in raincoats !!) staggering under the weight of pieces of vintage test equipment etc. and trying to get back to their cars without dropping it.

There were lots and lots of very expensive equipment offered for sale, and some bits and pieces for the junk box, although the amount of this has diminished, the same as it has back home.

I was looking for a few bits and pieces for equipment renovation, but only ended up with some Eddystone knobs for me, and a couple of bags of assorted resistors for Bob G8CQR.

However, as the 'Rally Price' was very favourable, I did lash out on a Sark 110 Antenna / Vector Analyser, which is also a TDR, signal generator, and has many other functions, including a Smith Chart display. My kitset analyser from India worked well for a time but has now given up the ghost.

Anyway, a few more photos to set the scene. (The crowds got so thick after I took these, that it was difficult to move in the hall, let alone to be able to see what was on offer).
